Before the school closure, our brilliant team of Year 6 Student Librarians had been busy writing up reviews of their favourite library books to share with the school.




Auggie and Me: Three Wonder Stories by R. J. Palacio


Black Beauty by Anna Sewell


The Boy in the Dress by David Walliams


The Boy in the Striped Pyjamas by John Boyne


Doctor Who: Wishing Well by Trevor Baxendale


Dog Man: Unleashed by Dav Pilkey


A Girl Called Owl by Amy Wilson


Journey to the River Sea by Eva Ibbotson


Minecraft: Guide to Ocean Survival


Secrets of a Sun King by Emma Carroll


Tales to Give You Goosebumps by R. L. Stine
