

English:

Our first novel to welcome the children into the juniors will be *Charlotte's Web* by E.B. White. The children will meet Wilbur the pig, saved at birth by Fern, the farmer's daughter, and sent to live on a separate farm where he meets Charlotte the spider. The children will be consolidating and improving their use of continuous cursive handwriting and getting used to writing with smaller lines. They will initially focus on descriptive pieces, expanding their vocabulary and developing their use of technical features such as fronted adverbials. Basic punctuation is another key focus, with commas to be used after fronted adverbials and speech to be introduced.

Maths:

Our learning in maths will begin with a focus on place value and conceptual understanding of number. We will be looking to move from the use of blank number lines for addition and subtraction to formal column methods to improve efficiency and allow the children to handle larger numbers more comfortably. Formal written methods will also be learnt for multiplication and division. Beginning to learn the 3, 4 and 8 times tables is also a focus.

Topic:

Our history topic is the Romans, where we will be learning about a variety of aspects linked to everyday life, culture, empire and language, linking to our study of Latin which will run concurrently. In science we will be looking at humans and animals, including learning about skeletons, diets and food chains. Computing will see us learning about digital literacy, specifically cyberbullying, and all four Year 3 classes will be having food and nutrition lessons for their D.T.

Other information:

PE will take place on Monday afternoon and Friday morning each week. Children will need to have the correct sports kit in school every week for these sessions. The PE requirement is white t-shirt, black shorts/sports leggings/jogging bottoms, and trainers. On Fridays, children should come to school in their PE kit and bring their school uniform with them in their bags to change into later. Warmer clothes (a plain black/navy blue jumper and/or a coat) would be advisable as PE will almost always take place outside.

Children need to bring in their own water bottle from home.

All Year 3 classes will be dismissed at the end of the day from the Silverthorne playground.

Please label all aspects of your child's uniform with their name, including their PE kit, as this makes it much easier to reunite their belongings with them!

How can I help:

Please read with your child as regularly as possible — little and often is the best. This can be a mixture of them reading to you, you reading to them or shared reading.

Supporting your child to learn their times tables is a huge help, as so much of the maths curriculum throughout primary school is made easier by good knowledge of multiplication and division facts. The 3, 4 and 8 times tables are the main priority in Year 3.

Please support your child with any homework they may be set and with their weekly spellings. These will be made available on the Year 3 webpage.




