At the end of a word, the 'j' sound is spelt -dge straight after 'short' vowel sounds (like 'a' in 'cat' and 'o' in 'cot').	After all other sounds, whether vowels or consonants, the 'j' sound is spelt as -ge at the end of a word.	In other positions in words, the 'j' sound is often (but not always) spelt as g before e, i, and y.	The 'j' sound is always spelt as j before a, o and u.
